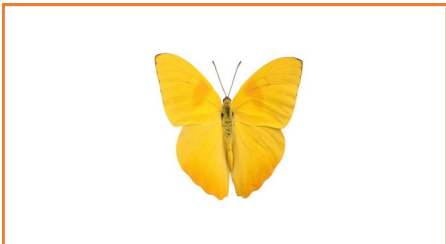


Making a Revision Timetable




Your Work Space

It is important to organise your work for every subject before the revision period

Ensure there are no gaps in your notes

	<p>Clear your desk and have all you need to revise close by</p> 	
	<p>Make sure it is well lit with a comfy chair</p> 	
	<p>→ Where will you set up your study area?</p>	

Try varying your location:

You could study outside on sunny days, plan revision sessions in the library or schedule occasional work sessions with friends

Avoid listening to music with lyrics while you are revising, the words in the song will clash with the facts you are learning

What are your main distractions?
